The actual 'meat' of a document -- all of the words, images, and links which a user can read and interact with. I use this term a lot to mean "whatever you put in the document."

Content means all forms of information, and without limitation includes: text, formatted text such as HTML pages, interactive and/or dynamic Web pages (such as those generated from data files and databases), images, animation, video and sound files. It may also include software, Web-based output from software applications and Web-based input (ie. transactions).

Think of content as the foundation which holds the Web page together; build from the ground up and make it easy to understand. In the CMF worldview, everything is content. This applies to traditional things such as HTML pages. But it also applies to dynamic information such as posts in a threaded discussion or calendar events. It also means that images, downloadable executables, logic in scripts, etc. are also content.

The subject matter or discipline that teachers are being prepared to teach at the elementary, middle level, and/or secondary levels. Content also refers to the professional field of study (e.g., special education, early childhood, school psychology, reading, or school administration).

Content is the second attribute in a meta tag; it describes the data or information stored in the meta tag. Also, the term content is often used to describe the information presented in a web page as opposed to the

mark-up or code used to control the presentation.

The content needs to be transformed from its original state into ASF in order for a server to stream it. Windows Media servers can stream live ASF streams or stored .asf files as content.
